n the readings of this Fourth Sunday of Easter, three phrases really stood out for me: In the First Reading, "The stone rejected by the builders, which has become the cornerstone." In the Second Reading, we are "the children of God." And in the Gospel, Jesus description of himself as "the good shepherd."


That phrase, spoken by Peter in our First Reading, is actually taken from Psalm 118, verse 22. He is addressing the Sanhedrin, the leaders, and the elders of the people of Jerusalem. Peter had cured a man who was crippled from birth, and he did so in the name of Jesus, the Nazorean. He reminded that assembly that this was the same Jesus whom they had crucified, and whom God raised from the dead. That simple phrase "crucified and raised from the dead" is what the apostles were tasked with proclaiming to everyone. It is called the *kerygma*, the fundamental proclamation about Jesus' Death and Resurrection. That building block which they had scorned was now the cornerstone of their salvation.

In our Second Reading we are told that we are now called the children of God. The love of God the Father has been given to us, manifested in the gift of his only Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ. When John wrote this letter to his community, he was warning them of about a group of unorthodox people who questioned that Jesus was both fully human and fully divine. That same group also thought that keeping the commandments and living Jesus' command of love were inadequate for salvation. In short, they thought that Jesus' dying and rising was not enough to achieve salvation and that there was something more they had to do in order to be saved. They ignored the fact that there is nothing we can do that is greater than what Jesus had already done. As the children of God, we realize that it is the Father's love and the Son's sacrifice which have saved us.

A number of years ago, I had the opportunity to study in northern Spain in the town of Burgos. One weekend, our group had the opportunity to take a trip into the countryside where we encountered a real flock of sheep (not a petting zoo...) and in its midst, a real shepherd. We were all struck by the appearance of that shepherd. He had piercing blue eyes, a head of curly hair, and although he was rather young, it was apparent that he had spent a lot of time outdoors. There he stood, in the middle of

all those sheep, with his shepherd's crook in his hand. And he smelled like his sheep. It was obvious he was dedicated to his job. *Un buen pastor* -a good shepherd.

I still had that image in my mind as I thought about today's Gospel. In it, our Lord tells us that he is the good shepherd, who is willing to lay down his life for his sheep. He will not abandon his flock at the first sign of danger. He reminds us that a hired hand would not do that. He would flee when predators or bandits approached because he was only working for the pay. He has no real concern for the sheep, but only for his own safety. In the end our Lord knows that there are other sheep



that do not belong to his flock. But when they hear the true shepherd's voice, they will follow and become one flock with one shepherd. Until that day, our Lord will tend his flock, shepherd's crook in his hand, leading us to good pasture and safety.



We were eating lunch and discussing the Easter Vigil we had celebrated in our parish just a few days before. She had sung in the choir, and I had taken my place in a pew, squirming as the solemn rituals were celebrated in a manner that I thought was just a bit too casual. "We didn't even begin in darkness," I lamented. "We just started with mood lighting and lit the candle almost as an afterthought."

She replied, "We brought it up to date. You're just too tied to that old stuff in the books."

Rather than argue, I changed the subject. I asked about her husband, who had recently undergone treatment for alcoholism. "You know," she said, "the difference between what life was like before he went to treatment and what life is like now is the difference between night and day."

I paused and said, "You know, the difference between what life was like before Christ came into



our lives and what life is like now is the difference between night and day. That's why we light a candle in the darkness, to remind ourselves."

"Oh," she said.


Stewardship in Support of SJF

Every day, we have the opportunity to be the face of Jesus to others. Please consider making a gift from your individual retirement plan (IRA) that benefits you and our parish. A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) allows individuals age 70½ or older to authorize their IRA administrator to make a direct transfer of funds from their IRA to qualified charities, tax-free.

There are three main benefits of giving with a QCD:

- 1. If you are 73 years old or older, the amount you transfer can satisfy all or part of your required minimum distribution.
- 2. The amount transferred directly to charity does not generate taxable income, which may reduce your annual income level. This may help lower your Medicare premiums and decrease the amount of Social Security that is subject to tax.
